- Working on unified approach to communications with Senior Management Team and Communications Officer.
- Passionate about advancing Indigenous initiatives and Indigenous practices. Will be working on making UC larger force in U of T mosaic.
- Keen to provide supporting role to newly reconfigured Advancement Team as they make scholarships and awards, restoration projects, endowed lectures and faculty positions at UC possible.
- Willing to make a difference learning from UC stakeholders as well as many offices and activities of the College.

4. REPORTS

- I. Update from the Acting Principal, Sali Tagliamonte
 - 1. Updates and proposed amendment to UC By-Laws (Suggested Amendments to By-Laws attached See Appendix 1)
 - Discussion prompted last year by need of 3 seats for Course Unions.
 - Need to maintain number of 10 elected appointed voting student members on council to avoid changes to constitution.
 - Markus consulted UC Lit to find out if they were prepared to move one of 8 elected appointed voting members to course unions.
 - Unions would be provided with one seat per each program.
 - Ex-officio student members will not be affected to counterbalance adjustment.
 - One student to be added to Curriculum Committee ensuring three course unions are represented.
 - UC Lit discussed proposal during summer which was unanimously approved on June 15, 2024.

- Sali and Kristina Cổ-Đoàn (UC Lit President) met in September to go through amendment details. UC Lit was informed that motion would be brought to first council meeting.

II. Update from the Lit President, Kristina Co-Doàn

Events

- UC Lit supported 4 orientation programs: Black Student Orientation, Commuter Orientation, Thrive and UC Orientation.
 - o Programs had chairs who formally met weekly to bi-weekly in Orientation board.
 - o Chairs reported updates and found ways to collaborate on orders, events and more
 - o Programs were very successful with improvement in enthusiastic participation from students.
 - Feedback from 1st year students and orientation leaders was positive.
- Vice President Divi organized UC Club's Fair and participation during UC Orientation was outstanding.
 - Student groups introduced themselves to incoming students and UC during busy
 Quad events held in the Quad.
 - Fun and charitable activity was held with students raising money for mental health research.

Elections

- Election coordinator Tricia who will take part in fall election season is welcomed for the year.
- Fiver first year representatives and formals commissioner are welcomed. They arrange event for Council to be introduced to Principal Tagliamonte, Vice Principal Gilbert, office of the Dean of Students and other UC staff.

Finance

- Finance Commissioner Behram Hathi has worked tirelessly to complete 1st audit which has been difficult. There are two more audits to be completed.
- Special thanks to Jared and Naeem for supporting UC Lit through the audit process.
- UC Lit Council will discuss how to responsibly manage funds left after paying outstanding costs/debts from previous years.
- Commissioners and groups looking forward to putting newly distributed funds into beneficial programming for UC students. Behram Hathi can be contacted for questions.

Other Projects

- Steady supply of menstrual products throughout UC washrooms will be put in place.
- Care packages for unhoused in Toronto will be created in collaboration with other student groups to prepare for cold months ahead.
- Possibilities to extend eat-after-eight program, an anti-food waste program operating with Victoria College are being considered. Working with other leaders to implement program to UC and campus wide.
- UC Lit will collaborate with other college councils to fundraise for countries struggling during humanitarian crisis (Lebanon, Gaza, Sudan, and Congo are included).
- Taking data from UTSU student needs survey and census to adjust programming to needs of students.

III. Update from the Chief Administrative Officer, Yvonne MacNeil (Event's chart attached – See Appendix 2)

Administrative Updates

- Events Team has moved to UC59:
 - Yulia Belavina is Acting Events Manager in place of Marly Rosen who is currently on leave.
 - o Bonnie Huang is AV and Infrastructure Coordinator.
 - o Cyanne Chun recently joined as Events Assistant.
 - o Approximately 10 students were hired to be on call for Events Team.
- Program Coordination at main office UC173:
 - o Timothy Cherian is Program Coordinator for Canadian Studies/Health Studies.
 - o Danielle Meade is Program Coordinator for Cognitive Science/UC One.
 - Take care of all program activities, student program events, contacts and program director support.
 - Khamla Senthavy is Assistant to Vice Principal and Academic Liaison with Faculty of Arts & Science.

- Schedules classroom spaces, policy and practice, advise, sessional/teaching assistant postings, hiring policies and procedures and all program and writing center support.
- Liaises with work-study hiring for all departments in the college.

• CAO Facilities also at UC173:

- o Joe Abrego, Facilities Coordinator.
 - Responsible for facilities calls (cleaning, washing, etc.), moves, painting, general facility needs and coordinating with Property Manager, who is a great help.

• Finance and HR moved to UC45:

- o Maricar Velasco is Financial Services Officer.
 - Gives HR Policy and Practice advice and services to all HR Groups within College and ancillary operations including Academic HR, PM, USW Appointed and Casual, CUPE.
 - Has financial responsibility for operating and ancillary budgets and forecasting processes.
- O Susan Dick (former Receptionist) is now Finance and Payroll Assistant.
 - Provides HR Processing Policy and Practice advise on various financial activities (personal expense claims, invoices, credit card reconciliations).
 - Does accounting for Operating and Ancillary budgets.
- New administrative and financial assistant who will sit at front desk of UC173 to be hired within next days.
 - New assistant to support Susan/Maricar with overload and will have financial component to job as well as taking care of packages, answering questions, etc.

• Office of the Principal in UC165:

- o Abigayhil Aponte is Executive Assistant to the Principal.
- Georgia Laidlaw moved into UC Communications Coordinator position after working various contracts.

Projects

- UC Laidlaw Project was moving along but currently delayed with estimated completion time in June 2025.
- UC Landmark Project complete with opening ceremony being held this weekend at Convocation Hall.
- UC Book Sale going well. Landmark Project's opening ceremony could generate extra business for book sale over the weekend.

Events

- Soft opening took place between January 2023 to August 2023.
- Full opening from September 2023 to August 2024.
- Clark Reading Room is only being used for student events (17 total).
- Events team busy making good use of spaces especially Clark Reading Room.

Financials

- Original expense budget for 2023/2024 went over due to salary and retroactive payments in all employee areas and additional expenses incurred by people returning to offices.
- Offices upgraded to higher wiring and almost everyone has been moved to using laptops and docking stations.
- Covered shortfall with discretionary funds and income from events rentals.
- Investments with event rental funds to cover costs of upcoming upgrades to PCC/SCR. No updates made to equipment (10 years old) due to Covid.
- Next Budget process starts in January 2025.
- Recovery from trust is designated at standard 250K. Overhead support coming back from pandemic recovery from ancillary operations with approximate transfer of 150K.
- Residency Operations continues to recover from pandemic deficit and is currently ahead of forecast. Year ended with positive 418K below forecasted outcome due to removal of block of rooms from inventory 2023/2024.
- Repairs, upgrades and salary retroactive pay for all salary groups were substantial.
- Summer business has returned to pre-pandemic numbers and will help with recovery.
- Mortgage payment went up for 2023/2024 due to increase in interest rates.
- Capital reserves of 2.7 million are anticipated for long range budget planning into 2028/2029.
- Operating budget is at 703 million and unrestricted at 7.4 million, still on track.
- Food services recovery slower but currently ahead of 5-year plan. Year ended with 233K from originally forecasted lost of 142K.
- Large increase in food and rooms removed from plan/meal plan lowered income.
- Catering and cash sales income 2023-2024 ended at double original budget. UC catering use policy, space rental, increased cash business/resident cups at Owlery contributed to it.
- Forecasted recovery for 2024/2025 started with unrestricted surplus. Deficit continues to be challenge with break-even for 2028/2029 being forecasted.

IV. Update from the Advancement Director, Adam Hess

Fundraising

• UC Advancement raised 30% more fundraising revenue than this time last year. This is a great achievement for students.

- Special Campaign to UC Alumni (1980) was ran and it outperformed what was expected.
- Dana Seidler secured a significant gift to Queer and Trans Research Lab.
- Recent gifts that were closed in current fiscal year include:
 - 250K to support student scholarships secured by Nia Morrison.
 - 200K enhancement by Shanley Lee and family to expand Jane Lee Student Award.
 - Two estate gifts totalling 200K and 100K to support black and Indigenous student scholarships.
- Event held in March recognized donors to library alcove (part of revitalization campaign) an opportunity for front facing fundraisers to reconnect with donors.
- Team will partner with A&S on faculty wide leadership donor event where UC and UC Lit will have presence.
- Achieved significant results during U of T's Giving Day featuring Indigenous Academic Excellence Award, UC Annual Fund and University College Alumni Scholarships and Bursaries Fund.
 - Raised 36K in donations through phone bank strategy (126 donors reached), 20k in pledges and 18k in matching U of T funds.
 - Team invited to present case on approach/results with other University Advancement teams.

Alumni

- June Convocation reception had ~ 600 attendees, a first opportunity to engage with alumni.
- 150% increase in new alumni engagement (individuals who have never interacted/engaged with UC) during 2023-2024 fiscal year.

Events

- Trish Bunnett contributed to Advancement Events and efforts to target unengaged alumni.
- Trivia night was held in Jr Common Room, Puppy Yoga in Clark Quad and Haunted UC Tour to take place upcoming weeks.
- Rosalie Abella to present biographical film "Without Precedent" in upcoming Influential Voices series. Event currently sold out and waitlisted expecting livestream attendance of 200 guests.
- UC Mentorship Program kickoff to be held on October 23rd.

Human Resources

• Donor Relations Officer role vacant with Benjamin Wood joining next week.

- Recruitment for Alumni Relations position closed with someone expected to join team soon.
- Nia Morrison thanked for working with Student Engagement Officer Program.
- Principal's Advisory Committee meeting to review campaign priorities/advancement held with Markus Stock last June.
- Upcoming meeting will be held with Sali Tagliamonte and senior volunteer group on October 24th.
- V. Update from the Registrar, Ryan Woolfrey (New Awards list attached See Appendix 3)

Human Resources

- Angela Hansen retired after 20 years and selected recipient of A&S Dean's Outstanding Long Service Award last June. Marta Heppomaki filled her role.
- May Deanthi Fernando took a 1-year leave as an academic advisor at Victoria College.
- Mandy Nelson joined the team as a frontline advisor after working at UC Dean of Student's office.

Advising

- High demand for in-person advising services (back to pre-pandemic levels).
- Virtual welcome sessions and course selection workshops were offered to newly admitted students.
- Financial Aid, Scholarships and Awards, Accessibility Services and Learning Strategy Supports sessions offered to new students on UC101.
- New proactive advising initiative for newly admitted students was introduced where Advisors worked on identifying and troubleshooting issues before term begins.
- Increased online drop-in availability during first 3 weeks of classes, which proved to be successful with short wait time for students.
- Piloted new certificate program for Upper Year students called "Crafting Effective Graduate and Professional School Applications".

Administrative

- Sessional dates harmonized for all first entry divisions across all U of T campuses.
- Orientation started a week earlier with increase in advising and drop-in appointments for month of August.

- December exam period may result in need to run exams on Sunday due to increase in number of projected in-person final exams (fall term courses). Currently being reviewed by LSM.
- Last exam day for A&S division set for December 21st, 2024.
- June deferred exam period removed due to low attendance.

Admissions & Enrollment

- Early concerns around international yield due to new IRCC requirements limiting number of study permit approvals for international applicants.
- Full update on new student intake and overall 2024-25 enrollment data to be provided in November.

Graduation

- 932 UC students graduated at two spring convocation ceremonies with well attended Convocation Receptions.
- Fall convocation to be held on October 28th due to revised sessional dates.
- 160 UC students to receive degrees in ceremony with fellow graduates from Innis, New, St. Mike's and Trinity Colleges.

Financial Aid & Awards

- Over 4 major central admission scholarships awarded to newly admitted students (including a National Scholar, Arbor Award recipient, and David Naylor Scholar).
- Over 250 international or international merit scholarships of 50K or 100K awarded.
- 2 UC students nominated for Global and Prairies Competition of Rhodes Scholarship.
- Renewable admission and in-course scholarship assessments and disbursement underway (notifications in 2-3 weeks).
- Harcourt Brown Travel Fellowship applications open and due by December 1st.
- Breakdown of UC's 2023-24 award expenditures to be presented in November.
- Motion to approve new 2024-25 UofT Scholarship Committee membership to be presented in November.

VI. Update from the Dean of Students, Naeem Ordóñez

Summer Programs

• E-mentorship program successfully ran with active Discord servers between mentors and incoming students.

Residences and Move-in

- 180 U of T students supported by 7 dons stayed in residences during summer, despite decrease in student population.
- Generated close to \$800,000 from summer groups which helps us keep fees for residences/increases in manageable state.
- Orientation and start of classes moved to the Tuesday after Labor Day weekend.
- Staff pre-service training moved up by a week and took place over 2 weeks (40+ training sessions across U of T).
- 28 student staff working at residence desks.
- 2 move-in weekends: 504 first year students moving in from August 25-27 and 160 upper year students moved during Labor Day weekend.
- Aiming for 80% first year and 20% upper year students in residence.

Other projects

- Adding fob access to Whitney Hall to improve safety and security to residency access.
- Installation of wireless access points in residence buildings to improve connectivity and Wi-Fi access for students has begun.
- Completion of wireless access points across three residences expected for this year.

Orientation and Transition

- Commuter Orientation had 35 student participants and 15 leaders who stayed in residences.
- Thrive Orientation (2 day academically focused event) had 120 students registered.
- UC orientation returned to full 7-day programming schedule and 620 incoming students registered.

- Pre-U of T Academic Orientation (5 academic panels) had estimated attendance of 1,900 students and first-time participation from other colleges.
- Black Student Orientation (intercollegiate program) was hosted and led by UC this year.
- International Student Welcome event was held in SCR and coordinated in partnership with AARO.
- Special thanks to Chef Mike and his team for supporting catering/food needs for student participants and programmers, student leaders and staff's attention to off-campus students.

Human Resources

- Arabella Arcaina joined as Coordinator of Student Life Programs to support academic recovery intervention and support program (Strive) and student engagement and transitions programs.
- Vidhi Kochhar joined as Coordinator of Student Community Development to support offcampus students and commuter student experience.
- Lauren Shaw joined as Residence Operations Coordinator and supports admissions and day-to-day operational needs of residents and student residence experience.
- Recruiting for an assistant to begin Community Wellness.

VII. Update from Vice Principal, Emily Gilbert

New Faculty Appointments

- Simon Lewsen appointed as Assistant Professor and Acting Director of the University College Writing Centre, filling in for Jerry Plotnick during research leave. Lewsen has extensive experience teaching in Writing Centre and is renowned writer who recently received Canadian Association of Journalists award for work on university experience.
- Dr. Leanne De Souza Kenny joined college Assistant Professor Teaching Stream in joint appointment between Health Studies and Human Biology & Global Health Programs.
 She has taught in Health Studies Program for three years and holds prestigious academic positions.
- Dr. Tope Adefarakan joined as Assistant Professor Teaching Stream in Canadian Studies, with a joint appointment with the Transitional Year Program. She has taught at U of T since 2004 and brings valuable experience to college.
- Six new faculty members were appointed as fellows to college: Funké Aladejebi, Dirk Bernhardt-Walther, Colleen Dockstader, Lance McCready, Sali Tagliamonte, and Alan Verskin. Each fellow brings unique expertise and contributions to respective fields.

Barker Fairley Distinguished Visitor

- Award-winning artist, writer, and educator Richard Fung was announced as Barker Fairley Distinguished Visitor 2024-2025 and has made significant contributions to college sharing insights on various social and cultural issues.
- Screening of Richard Fung's latest film "The Enigma of Harold Sonny Ladu" scheduled for October 23rd at Innis Town Hall.

Program Updates

• UC One:

 First-year suite of courses at near full capacity: 95 students enrolled. Incoming students are enthusiastic and engaged as evidenced by participation in Orientation and UC One class.

• Health Studies:

- o Program will be renamed to Public Health next academic year, reflecting curriculum changes approved last year.
- New courses introduced in 2024-2025 providing students with additional learning opportunities.

• Cognitive Science:

- Program is undergoing UTQAP process (comprehensive review of academic programs at U of T). New Director Dirk Bernhardt-Walther is leading the process.
- Special thanks to John Vervaeke who led Cognitive Science program for the last several years.

• Canadian Studies:

- Program is undergoing UTQAP process and is reviewing its curriculum due to recent appointments of Larissa Lai and Tope Adefarakan.
- New courses are being added to program offerings.

Current Initiatives:

- Equity Committee's membership currently being constituted. Jared Boland and Nia Morrison will continue work started last year.
- Faculty, staff and students from college programs and UC Lit members will also be on this committee.
- "Gathering our Little Shoes" followed by Round Dance in Quad was hosted by UC on September 24. Event was reflection of members of Indigenous Research and Learning Committee.
- College to participate on Orange Shirt Day (National Day of Truth and Reconciliation) on September 30
- UC Staff and academic leaders will be participating on Indigenous Walking Tours organized by UC's Vice- Principal.
- Organizing Indigenizing the Curriculum Workshop will take place on October 15 and is targeted to UC Program Instructors.

PRESENTATION: Indigenizing the Curriculum in A&S

Presenter: Andrew Bomberry, Haudenosaunee, Mohawk from the 6 Nations of the Grand River Territory from University of Toronto's Office of Indigenous Initiatives.

Indigenous Initiatives and the University of Toronto

- Office of Indigenous Initiatives created in 2017 to fulfill commitments of Truth and Reconciliation Commission.
- Wichitoan report contains calls to action that University has committed to.
- Focus on curricular goals and cultural competency training (done by Andrea Johnson and John Crouch).

Cultural Competency Training

- Two broad categories of training: one workshop and a suite of workshops.
- Workshop on indigenizing curriculum for all 3 campuses, departments, and faculties.
- Challenges in providing deep background in every possible discipline.
- Goal of workshop is to provide practical tools and knowledge to participants.
- Three components to workshop:
 - o Defining indigenization, decolonization, and reconciliation in context of curriculum.
 - o Exploring indigenous epistemologies and interaction with disciplines.
 - o Working through indigenous curriculum framework.

Cultural Competency Workshop Series

- Four workshops: Allyship, Journey Towards Reconciliation (parts 1 and 2), and Land Acknowledgements.
- Focus on providing essential background knowledge and practical tools.
- Workshop goal is to help participants understand history of Indigenous Peoples and Canada contextualize present issues and creating meaningful land acknowledgements.

Question from Isabelle Cochelin: Will there be any announcements and how will registration for the workshops work?

Answer from Andrew Bomberry: The curriculum workshop will be conducted internally, and I will lead the session on cultural competency at the scheduled time, while participants will need to register individually. We may consider organizing a separate workshop specifically for teachers, but due to high demand and limited trainer availability, we have set a guideline that requires a minimum of 25 participants for such arrangements. If this number isn't met, instructors are encouraged to direct their students to register independently. I will follow up with an email containing direct links to the workshop, as the OII website is currently undergoing accessibility updates and isn't user-friendly. Librarians are welcome and encouraged to join. I have done 2 workshops for librarians who support the faculties and that specific liaison role.

Comment from Emily Gilbert: Although the workshop is primarily intended for college program instructors, I'm open to including others if space allows, and we are already discussing the possibility of offering another session next term. Currently, we are aiming for a maximum of around 25 participants to maintain an effective learning environment, and I will keep anyone interested on a waitlist for future opportunities.

Question from Christina Kramer: Has there been any thought of not having a certificate but potentially livestreaming it so people could listen and gain knowledge from hearing the discussion due to its potential broad interest across the college? I am retired but I think this could be of broad interest if streamed online

Answer from Andrew Bomberry: Sorry but there is no certificate for indigenizing curriculum workshop, that's more for the cultural competency.

Comment from Emily Gilbert: We did two of the workshops during Covid online that were open to all staff and faculty, but you might not have been included in that list.

Question from Sali Tagliamonte: Could you give us a couple of tasters or your top tips for beginning this process?

Answer from Andrew Bomberry: There's going to be a concept we talk about called 'two-eyed' which is the idea that Western knowledge does not go out the window when talking about indigenizing the curriculum. Instead, people hopefully become aware that Indigenous

people are heavily engaged in Western knowledges and employing it for their own benefit and values. This often changes the nature of what we're doing with Western knowledge, but it stays in the room. One thing to consider if you are having a difficult time seeing how your discipline could connect that two-eyed seeing is an area worth pursuing where people engage with the discipline where it might seem alike. An example would be cognitive behavioural therapy which is very effective in providing mental health treatments for a variety of issues. So many indigenous communities engage in a combination of cognitive behavioural therapy and land-based teaching and then they put the two together they get much better results that if they only did cognitive behavioural therapy or if they only did land-based teaching. Thinking about the reconciliation aspect there can be a pathway from your discipline and from your curriculum to think about how you can be engaged in that process of reconciliation.

Question from Emily Gilbert: A few years back Gabrielle and I were having a conversation and looking at some literatures on land-based learnings and some of them suggested that Indigenous peoples and Indigenous elders should be the ones who lead land-based learnings. What are your thoughts on that? Who should be doing land-based learnings?

Answer from Andrew Bomberry: It depends on how you're defining land-based teachings and what you are trying to do. If there's a ceremony involved, that ceremony should be done by a ceremonial leader who is typically an indigenous person. There are also other ways of engaging with the land with important relevance for Indigenous peoples but it's not necessarily something that is a ceremony which opens a larger conversation on how we are defining the term land-based teaching and what are we trying to do about it and it also depends. The short answer is that if there's a ceremonial component, then it's probably best handled by a ceremonial leader.

Question from Sali Tagliamonte: Hopefully in the workshop we will learn what is ceremony in land-based learning is that correct?

Answer from Andrew Bomberry: I would not say that you'll walk out with a clear answer on that, but you'll have principles that will help guide you. The curriculum framework has specific guidance for how to be engaged in indigenous materials and it helps to avoid things like appropriation. This will be addressed in the workshop, yes.

Question from Sali Tagliamonte: That would be something individuals would learn from doing the workshops in the Center correct? And we'll have to wait for the website to work to enroll or can we do it now?

Answer from Andrew Bomberry: This is the one that's coming up the day after Thanksgiving which is a Tuesday and I am happy to do more sessions, there are many in need but ideally this is a relationship and as discussed there might be a better time to come back especially at the start of the next semester as more people are here.

Comment from Kristina Cổ-Đoàn: This is such an interesting and amazing initiative from the student perspective. I might not be here by the time we see this implemented by other professors, but I am sure that the impact on it will be very positive for classes ahead. The cultural competency series could even be beneficial for student leadership because at the Lit we try to play an active role within Truth and Reconciliation and some of these would be great not only for Student Council but other groups as well, if that's something the office would ever want to do.

Comment from Andrew Bomberry: We offer cultural competency training all year round and students are strongly encouraged to come, register, experience, learn and discuss.

UNIVERSITY COLLEGE BY-LAWS OF COUNCIL

I.	Rules of Procedure for the Election and Appointment of Members to Council
I-1.	Elections and appointments for all constituencies will be completed and reported to the Secretary of Council by the end of September of each year (though an exception will be made for the appointment of Undergraduate Student representatives in their first year, where some extra time might be required for appointment).
I-2. Election/Appointment Procedures	 Undergraduate Student representatives will be appointed by the Council of the College's Literary and Athletic Society for a one-year term. Undergraduate Student representatives will be appointed by the Presidents of the Course Unions of the programs that the College sponsors for a one-year term. Senior Don, preferably a UC member, will be appointed by the residence dons for a one-year term. Graduate Student representative will be nominated and elected by and from among the Graduate Students for a one-year term. Administrative Staff representatives will be nominated and elected by and from among the Administrative Staff for a two-year term, with the terms staggered so that one new Administrative Staff representative joins Council each year. Teaching Staff and Other Academic Appointees. All Teaching Staff not holding major administrative roles (those governed by the "Policy on Appointment of Academic Administrators") and any Other Academic Appointees who opt to be included, not already on Council, and not having just finished a term on Council shall be listed on a ballot and all Teaching Staff and Other Academic Appointees shall have the opportunity to vote for up to as many members as vacancies in the complement of atlarge Teaching Staff and Other Academic Appointees on Council. Those receiving the highest number of votes shall be appointed to a two-year term to fill all vacancies, with the appointments staggered so that half of the Teaching Staff and Other Academic Appointee representatives are new each year. If a member of the Teaching Staff or Other Academic Appointee on Council must vacate his or her seat after one year, the seat will be filled on an interim basis by the member of the Teaching Staff or

	Other Academic Appointee receiving the most votes after the two-year terms have been filled. In no case shall more than four Teaching Staff or Other Academic Appointees with primary appointments in a given Department or EDU:A be elected to Council in at-large positions. Tie votes will be broken by drawing names from a hat. 1 Alumnus/Alumna, appointed by the Principal in consultation with the Executive Committee.	
I-3. Terms of Office for Ex Officio Undergraduate Student members	Incoming ex-officio Undergraduate Student members shall join Council on July 1; the outgoing ex-officio Undergraduate Student members shall serve throughout the academic year of their terms in office.

A recommendation from the Executive Committee to establish a Special	
	Committee shall include terms of reference, an outline of membership, the anticipated reporting date, and the proposed date of disestablishment.

To be awarded to University College students entering their second, third, or fourth year of study from the Arts, Science, or Commerce programs on the basis of academic merit.

Laleh Bighash Award at University of Toronto

To be awarded to students registered at University College on the basis of financial need.

Pamela Gravestock Memorial Fund

To be awarded to Canadian Studies students on the basis of academic merit. Preference for students who completed "CDN405 – The University in Canada".

Saila Michael Memorial Bursary at the University of Toronto

To be awarded to an undergraduate Indigenous student registered at University College on the basis of financial need.
